Grand Haven, MI August 2024 was a special place for all things U.S. Coast Guard as 2024 marked the 100th anniversary of what started as a Coast Guard only picnic at the local Coast Guard station with rowing competitions for those service members stationed in Grand Haven. Flash forward from 1924, and 2024 to witness the respect, admiration, and love for the Coast Guard which pulses through the community. One hundred years of anything is a big deal and Grand Haven's Festival was no exception. The Escanaba Park Memorial Service featured Coast Guard Commandant ADM Linda Fagan making her first trip to Grand Haven. I also want to sincerely thank all who have contributed their time and energy to participate, coordinate and assist in recent events. From June through December 2024, 35 of our members have participated in the 39 performances shown on the "Performances to Date" list.

More detailed information about these National Events is posted in this newsletter and on the band website's **"Event Sign Up Page"** under "Event Descriptions 2025". As always, our participation in these performances is contingent on a sufficient number of USCGPB performers committing to attend. All USCGPB members are to visit the website and review the events, then go to the "Event Sign Up Page" and complete the form for every event - "Yes" "No" or "Maybe." IT IS INCUMBENT ON EVERY USCGPB MEMBER TO COMPLETE A SIGNUP FORM WHETHER YOU CAN ATTEND OR NOT.

As to the status of the band, we currently have approximately 130 band members with 55 Active Members which represents about 42% of the total membership, up from 38% last year. Of the 130 members approximately 24 are currently being reviewed for deletion from the member roster due to inactivity.

Due to recent issues, we must remind all members that in order to stay in compliance with the Band By-laws and regulations you must comply with the following:

- All performances and public appearances by USCGPB members, representing us in our uniforms, must be approved by the Pipe Major prior to the event.
- If you are contacted for a last-minute performance with insufficient time to submit an MRF, contact the PM by phone for a verbal approval. The MRF can be submitted later.
- Be sure you are properly uniformed in accordance with our Uniform Regulations (available on our band website.) Be very careful that any photos posted on public media of you in our uniform shows you properly dressed.

We must continue to focus on maintaining the highest musical, uniform and deportment standards possible. Please rededicate yourself to improving your skills. We've got a great thing going here. Let's keep it going and growing.

The Coast Guard Pipe Band Kit ... A balance of service and tradition

The USCGPB Uniform Regulations (USCGPBINST M1020.6 – series) were updated on July 12, 2024 and constitute the specific guidance that all Band members are required to follow with regard to uniforms, appearance (including grooming), and deportment. The updated version is posted on the Band website in the Member Area under "Uniforms."

Some highlights from those regs include: Band members are not allowed to wear a USCGPB uniform at any event not approved by the PM. Band members are not to appear in public wearing any combination of uniform items that are not specifically provided for in the USCGPB Uniform Regs unless authorized by the Uniform Prescribing Official for a given event (PM).

Any member of the Band may make a proposal regarding uniforms to the Uniform Board (DM, PM, and QM) for consideration. If

Band members fail to follow our uniform regs (including grooming standards), they put the Band at risk of having the Commandant rescind our "affiliated" status and permission to use the term "U.S. Coast Guard" in our name. That would effectively end the USCGPB.

USCGPB Policy Guidance on Wearing the Uniform

"When called upon to provide USCG decedent services, USCG Pipe Band players will perform in uniform. When called upon to perform in support of an 'armed services' funeral or memorial event, the USCG Pipe Band player will perform in uniform. When a USCG Pipe Band player is called upon to provide funeral and or memorial services for former military non-Coast Guard decedents, the USCG Pipe Band uniform is authorized. When a USCG Pipe Band player is called upon to provide funeral and or memorial services for non-military non-Coast Guard decedents, the USCG Pipe Band uniform may be authorized on individual merit. Please check with the Pipe Major for authorization. In any event, and at no time will a USCG Pipe Band player solicit or accept compensation while performing in a USCG Pipe Band uniform. As non-acceptance of a gratuity may be perceived as inappropriate, if and when offered, accept on behalf of the United States Coast Guard Pipe Band and indicate that the "donation" will be used to further US COAST GUARD ACADEMY Cadet Piper studies."

AUXMU Program Now Open to Pipers and Drummers!

Shipmates, we have exciting news for Auxiliarists: the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Musician (AUXMU) Program is now officially open to pipers and drummers. This is a great step forward that recognizes the unique contributions of our musical traditions to the Coast Guard and its Auxiliary. The Auxiliary Musician Program has been underway for a decade and part of the Coast Guard Auxiliary's public affairs mission. Members of the AUXMU program are qualified and authorized to perform at official Coast Guard ceremonies, public events, parades, and other special occasions, helping to promote the Coast Guard's missions and foster goodwill within the community.

Historically, the AUXMU program has only included classical/symphonic instrumentalists and vocalists. Over the past six years, a small team from USCGPB consulted with the A-Directorate of the Auxiliary, the Army School of Bagpipes and Highland Drumming in Scotland, and the US Coast Guard Band to build a similar qualification system for what we do. The result is a three-level PQS that allows USCGPB Auxiliarists to qualify their way up to AUXMU1, similar to other Auxiliary musicians.

The benefits of joining AUXMU as a Piping or Drumming Member include:

- Broader opportunities: Expand your performance reach beyond pipe band events into official Coast Guard ceremonies and community outreach initiatives.
- Professional development: As a certified AUXMU member, you'll be part of a network of talented musicians, with opportunities to refine your skills and gain recognition.
- Strengthen the Mission: Represent the Coast Guard and Auxiliary with pride, using your music to connect with the public and honor traditions.

How to Join:

The AUXMU program requires participants to meet certain qualifications. For pipers and drummers, this includes:

- Membership in the Coast Guard Auxiliary.
- Demonstrated musical proficiency, assessed through an audition or review process.
- Commitment to supporting the Coast Guard's mission through music.

Interested members should contact our AUXMU QEs for USCGPB: Pipe Major Loudermilk for pipes and Drum Major Conquest or Paul England for drumming. All candidates will begin at the AUXMU3 level.

At the October 15, 2024 meeting of AUX Flotilla 29, Lake Lanier, GA, a special presentation was made to the ATL-DET of the USCG Pipe Band by Rich Adams, FSO-NS, FSO-MT. The Adams family inherited a Spanish bagpipe, a "Gaita Asturiana" from his wife's family who were from Spain.

Knowing our

connection to bagpipes, the Adams family donated the pipes to the USCGPB. At the flotilla meeting, to receive the gift on behalf of the band, was PM M. L. Loudermilk, PS John Quinn, and Piper

Mr. Adams also provided a brief history of these particular pipes as follows: "The instrument is from Galicia, Spain and was donated to you and the band by my wife's parents Wigberto & Irene Vivas who lived in Spain. The Gaita was used in 1976 for the great annual pilgrimage that takes place to the tomb of the Apostle Saint James. This is an ancient journey and Gaitas are used as instruments during this tradition. This is one of the oldest religious pilgrimages known in Europe."

The Gaita is a family of single-droned bagpipes native to the autonomous communities of Principality of Asturias and Cantabria on the northern coast of Spain and played across Portugal, Asturias and Northern Zamora. The Gaita has only two reeded pipes, the chanter and one bass drone. A similar set of these pipes is on display at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and described as a mouth-blown bagpipe made of boxwood with a melodic pipe and one drone.



WWII Merchant Marine returned home for burial after 80 years as unknown



Chapel Cemetery near Armstrong, MO 80 years after his death. Wiper Spotts was originally buried in the U.S. Marine Cemetery on Betio Island as an unknown and his remains were located in 2017 and identified in 2018. U.S. Navy RADM Michael Poots, CO of the Navy Undersea Warfighting Development Center Groton, CT was the senior officer present representing the U.S. Navy along with officers and enlisted sailors from the Operational Support Unit Kansas City, US Coast Guard Pipe Band, and Missouri Army National Guard who conducted the burial ceremony with full military honors.

Piper Ken Hines and Drummer Ben Kenney provided music for the

homecoming and burial of WWII U.S. Merchant Marine sailor Elvis Nelson Spotts on November 9, 2024. Spotts was killed in February 1944 while working onboard the SS Cape Isabel at Betio Island, off the coast of Tarawa Atoll in the South Pacific. A small group of distant relatives and people from Missouri paid tribute to the 18-year-old Merchant Marine as he was laid to rest alongside his parents at Wesley

Coast Guard History Answers -

In 1915 the U.S. Revenue Cutter Service and the U.S. Life-Saving Service merged to form the U.S. Coast Guard.

And in 1939 the U.S. Lighthouse Service was brought into the U.S. Coast Guard.

The remaining two agencies that became part of the U.S. Coast Guard in 1946 were the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation and the Bureau of Navigation and Steamboat Inspection.



Out and About...Interesting Adventures by Our Band Shipmates

The inauguration of the President of the United States only comes around every four years and having the opportunity to participate in the ceremonies to honor the new President is even fewer and far between. USCGPB band members Mike Henry, Jack Mylott, and Michael Coonerty are associated with fire and police bands across the United States and were invited to play as members of the Florida Firefighters Pipes & Drums based in Palm Beach, FL for the historic inauguration parade of President Trump.

Getting selected among all the groups hoping to participate was the first challenge, and they were chosen to march and perform in the parade. The band consisted of 50 pipers and 10 drummers with seven others filling the Color Guard, Drum Majors, and Banner Carriers spots. Everything was all set for the parade until the cold weather threw a wrench into the works, and the parade

participants would be culled from 52 parade entries to **seven** and perform at the Capital One Arena in downtown Washington, DC instead of parading. The Florida Firefighters P&D <u>made</u> the cut. And just like our own home pipe and drum bands, the Florida Firefighters Pipes & Drums were able to adjust, adapt, and present a three-minute performance in the Arena for President Trump, gathered dignitaries, and guests that was a once in a life-time event.

Provisional USCGPB 2025 National Event Details

<u>British War Graves Services</u> — North Carolina Outer Banks, one in Buxton, NC, near the Hatteras Lighthouse and the second on Ocracoke Island, NC.

Wednesday, May 7, 2025 – Afternoon/evening rehearsals. Locations to be determined.

<u>Thursday, May 8, 2025 – Buxton, NC</u>. Not strenuous and only requires a short march in formation. **Hatteras Lighthouse** – After BWG service. Informal Performance of tunes of our choosing.

Friday, May 9, 2025 - Ocracoke Island, NC. We board a Ferry early to the island and meet near the grave sites.

National Law Enforcement Week Events - Washington DC, (TENTATIVE, based on member participation commitments and scheduled events.)

Rehearsal, Tuesday, May 13, 2025 - Rehearsal on Joint Airbase Anacostia Bowling (JAAB). Times TBD.

Wednesday, May 14, 2015 - There are several options available to us for performances:

- ➤ Slow Aire Pipe Band Competition (or Arlington National Cemetery Performance). Early morning. The Slow Aire Competition is combined with the NLEW Color Guard Competitions, usually on the west side of the U.S. Capitol.
 - ➤ WWII Memorial After the competition, a coach ride to the WWII Memorial.
 - ➤ **Vietnam Memorial** –Either a coach ride or casual walking on paved park trails, no marching.
 - **Korean Memorial** Casual walking on paved park trails, no marching.



- Fraternal Order of Police "Tent City" A coach ride from the Lincoln Memorial to the tent city site where we perform and can eat, drink, shop and rest for two hours or so.
- ➤ Memorial Service Parade A "relatively" short parade (usually around 8 to 10 blocks) to the National Law Enforcement Memorial.
